Greetings fellow IVD members,

First off, I want to thank everyone for their vote and electing me your new IVD Superintendent. I didn't think it was going to be that easy (Laugh Out Loud). But anyway, to start I want to assure all the members that I am in the process of keeping my promise, that with your help, we will make the IVD an organization our members can be proud of and hopefully boost membership and retention.

Secondly, I do not plan on using the Superintendents column in the Timetable to keep our members appraised of my on-goings as a modeler or as a railfan. I feel this column is best suited to keep you, our members, informed of what is going on or what we are working towards as an organization. And with the hopes that this information will encourage others into volunteering and being more active within our division.

So, with that being said. We had a great response (over 80%) from a majority of our members to the surveys I sent out shortly after the elections. The results were very positive and surprising as well. Now that's not saying we didn't receive some negative feedback as well, but that was few and to be expected.

The results of the survey questions were:

- 1. How likely would you attend an IVD meet on Saturday instead of Sunday? Positive=81%
- 2. Moving the meetings to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of the month.
- 3. How likely would you attend a centrally located meeting: Positive=85%
- 4. Meeting central location? Peoria= 78%
- 5. Longer clinics? No=60%/Yes=40%
- 6. Eliminate layout tours after IVD meets? No=61%/Yes=39%\*\*
  - a. Will be discussed during the May meet
- 7. Eliminate layout tours for bi-monthly round robin tours? No=29%/Yes=71%\*\*
  - a. Will be discussed during the May meet
- 8. Clinic time limit?
  - 90mins=3%//60mins=44%//45mins=53%

- 9. Attend an IVD cookout? Positive=83%
- 10. Attend a holiday meal? Positive=66%

We had a IVD Board meeting on April 21<sup>st</sup> and we covered the responses to the survey, which led to lengthy discussions to what we needed to act on first. So, with the results of these surveys and listening to our members, the board has voted to implement the following changes to IVD meets starting with the September 2018 IVD Meet.

- 1. Move the meetings to Saturday instead of Sundays.
  - a. Doors open at 12pm. Meeting starts at 1pm.
- 2. Centrally locate the meetings to the Peoria North Library in the Auditorium.
  - a. Address will be listed in this newsletter.
  - b. The auditorium seats 80 people and has a kitchen available to us if needed.
- 3. Based on the feedback on clinic lengths, we opted to allow up to 60mins per clinic, 2 clinics per meet
- 4. We will still try to arrange layout tours after the meets, but with the meeting being in Peoria, the layouts maybe limited, unless we can get other IVD members in the area to open up.
- 5. We are going to look into the round robin layout tours and operation sessions.
- 6. The IVD board will be hosting a cookout in July at Peck Park. Date/time to be determined.
- 7. An IVD holiday/banquet meal to be worked out.

Again, I want to thank everyone for their response to these surveys, as this allowed us to look at how we can better serve our members and to become a better organization. Remember these changes are due to you, our members, we listened and responded. The only way we can make these changes successful, is with your support and participation. So please attend <u>YOUR</u> IVD meetings regularly.

Also, we discussed the opportunity presented to the IVD


# NMRA NATIONAL **CONVENTION & TRAIN SHOW** August 5-12, 2018 Kansas City MO

The contests for May will be (1) Freight Cars and (2) Dioramas-On-Line. The Diorama-On-Line must have a rail related theme.



# WANDERINGS by Marion Brasher, MMR WHO ARE WE

During my second tenure as the Illinois Valley Division superintendent, I had a column entitled "Who Are We." Since, about ten years have passed, I was able to look at the currant Illinois Valley Division roster. Know what? We are getting a little long in the tooth. Our old timers range from forty to over sixty years as NMRA members. This group makes up about one quarter of our membership.

We have twenty life members and four members who have renewed each year for 54, 48, 45 and 43 years. This group has a lot of talent among us. However, many of this group do not attend division meets. They too, like me, exceed retirement age and probably do not like to travel to our bi-monthly meetings.

The National Model Railroad Association is quite an organization, founded in 1935. It has flourished for over 90 years. It was started by men with a foresight that our hobby had a future. I have had the privilege of attending many division, region and national meets. In every clinic attended or layout visited, there was something to be learned.

As a group we have many members who have solved problems, come up with short cuts, etc. It would be nice for our Illinois Valley Division members to pass on to the membership their methods of solving things related to Model Railroading.

Our goal is to pass on experience to our new members or refresh the memory of our older group. Remember, we are gathered at our meets to both teach and learn. In this way, we promote and enhance our favorite pastime to both our members and the general public.

# **By Larry Nelson**

I have always liked open loads. They give a railroad a very visual purpose for existence. Sometimes that purpose is easy to see, and sometimes we get to guess because of what is being hauled is hidden under tarps. I think this adds interest to a train's consist. Many odd shapes are hidden under those tarps. It could be almost anything of value that needs to be protected from the elements, prying eyes or sticky fingers. These tarped loads are usually found on flatcars or in gondolas.

I just happened to have some empty flatcars and gondolas which need to be earning some money, not just running around empty. I've made covered loads before with somewhat limited success. This usually involved

some sort of fabric or tissue. I could never seem to get the draped tarp look with a tarp that I looked for. In other words, it just didn't look believable to me. The fabrics looked too heavy and didn't droop properly. Tissue paper was thinner, but still didn't drape in a realistic way. I needed something that was thin, but looked like it had

weight and sagged as it passed over the load.

I have found something which looks really good to me and is very easy to work with. It is also something that we don't have to go out and buy. It is heavy duty aluminum foil food wrap.

The method that I use is very straight forward. It begins at my scrap wood pile. I like to make a base to work from out of flat pieces of basswood. You could also use plastic, brass, or any other thing you have handy. The size doesn't matter as long as it will fit within the width and length of the car you are using. Next, I cut various sizes and shapes to glue on this base to form some kind of mystery item being shipped. Since I am using wood, I use carpenters glue to hold everything in place. Before I start building my shape, I use a sanding block and slightly round off all the sharp edges. This is done to help me later when I'm putting the tarp on so I don't tear the tarp on the sharp edges. When you are building up your shape, try to keep it random with varied shapes and placements. The texture under the tarp is what will make it more interesting with sagging and shadows on the finished product. I put 1/2 once weight in the load to increase the weight of the car since flat cars and gondolas are usually underweight. Use your imagination here, and when you are satisfied it is time to add the tarp.

Cut a piece of foil large enough to cover the entire

OPEN LOADS-TARPED MACHINERY load. Next, turn the foil dull side up. I think this will hold the paint better. I then use Polybond general purpose adhesive to attach the foil to the highest point of the load.

Wait for this to dry since this will secure the tarp on one place as you begin to work the tarp down over the load. I find the best way to hold this is to grip the load with one finger on the high spot and my thumb on the bottom of the load. Starting at the top, be slow and

careful as you shape the tarp down over the load. I use a paint brush or the fingers on my free hand to gently bring the tarp down over the load, putting in sags and folds as you go. Work slowly so you will be less likely to tear the foil. When you get past the base you will fold the remainder under the base and carefully trim most of the excess off. Be careful here. You want to have about 1/8th inch turned under. Use a pair of decal scissors if you have

them. It is very easy to tear the foil with knife or razor blade. Secure the foil at the bottom with a little Polybond.

Now it is time to paint the load. I use Rust-Oleum rusty metal primer for better adhesion to the foil

and then one of the Rust-Oleum Camouflage colors, khaki in this case.

The final thing that I do is to place the load on a pallet or cribbing made from scale basswood. Be sure not to use too large of pieces for cribbing. It can spoil the scale look of your model.

I think you will enjoy the results. Use your imagination and have fun.

# DETAILS AND THE SCRAP BOX

Now that I have reached the point of declaring that the basic scenery on my layout is 100% complete, there is still much which will keep me busy. My definition of "basic scenery" is completion of land forms, trees, structures, roads, utilities for the villages and industries, and such which followed the completion of benchwork and the laying of mainline track and passing and industrial sidings.

# The Necessity of Details

Now there is much detail to add to scenes to make locations and structures come alive. Although I have recently read that scenes should not be "active," drawing the viewer away from the trains, I still believe that scenes should tell a story of life around the railroad being modeled. That author's point was that trains are the "main act" and nothing should distract the attention of the viewer from the trains. That would include autos and trucks which are representing moving vehicles on roads and streets. Partly because I am a scenery guy, I enjoy putting together street scenes and scenes which represent their own story, whether complex or simple.

Details are also important in refining our structures, track, locomotives, and passenger and freight cars. Application of details is also important for those who care to have their models judged for merit awards toward their Master Model Railroader designation.

# Where Do These Details Come From?

This seems like a simple question. Certainly, many of the details can be purchased at the local hobby store. Or can they be? Although I have a large inventory of models and parts, I still search hobby stores for detail parts. And, I find precious few of the parts I can use.

Going to the Walthers Catalog, referred to as the Reference Book, I find many of the parts I want. Perusing the Walthers book will give the modeler a good listing of most of the manufacturers of detail parts. But on searching the Walthers website, I find most of these parts are "out of stock" with an unknown restocking date. Researching the websites of the manufacturers of the desired detail parts, I find that the parts are available.

Detail parts are expensive. A Master Model Railroader, Jim Wise of our division, and one of my mentors, claims that a structure kit is the first third of the cost of the assembly of the kit on a diorama needed to place the kit into the scenery of the railroad.

Besides the traditional suppliers of detail parts, Shapeways has an extensive list of parts which can be ordered. This company manufacturers parts through 3D printing. Some modelers are purchasing their own personal 3D printers which are available from between \$300 to \$400 up to \$3,000 to \$4,000 for hobby quality printers. Quality of the printed parts depends on the cost of the machine and skill of the modeler. Manufacturers of 3D printed parts are using printers costing \$100,000 and up, beyond the reach of nearly all modelers. As the cost of 3D printers continues to come down, more modelers will venture into printing their own parts.

And then, there is the scrap box.


# **Detailing for the Less Technical Modeler**

Many of the details I have used as a less technical modeler come from my scrap box which are storage drawers of excess kit parts, and from use of simple tools. Model railroaders are famous for not disposing of "extra" parts which might (or might not) be used in a yet to be determined project in the future.

Now that my structure building days are over and I still having a desire to build things, I have begun to rehabilitate old cars, upgrade the cars in my fleet and collecting and building kits from the late 1950s and early 1960s. Many of the 50s and 60s kits had previously been started by their original owners who apparently gave up on the cars. These cars need loving care and detail parts. Two recent rehabilitations were wooden Illinois Central caboose kits.

Some of the parts needed were grab irons and railings which were hand formed from .020 wire with hobby sized needle nose plyers, cutters and a tool called a grabhandler. The grabhandler allows for the forming of






uniform grab irons. I also purchased three \$1 scrap

cabooses at a local swap meet for salvaging of appropriate are street lights, fire hydrants, traffic lights which would looking parts to be used on the wood cabooses.

Caboose railings were measured and formed with the needle nose plyers and wire cutters. It is a bit of a chore to get the measurement correct, but the first correct railing becomes the pattern for the remaining railings. The curved grabs for the cabooses were formed over the outside circumference of a small pill bottle.

Because just throwing parts into a scrap box makes parts hard to find, and if I would even remember I have the parts, my "scrap box" is a series of draws which hold classifications of parts (sort of). I have 556 storage drawers of differing sizes; some for scrap. Shown to the below is a number of such drawers for storage of scrap parts for freight cars.





The parts shown in the next column are for scenery, stored in portable trays for ease of use during scenery detailing. Most parts were salvaged from kits. Many parts are duplicates which would have been too busy on a single scene but will be useful in other locations. There

not have been appropriate for a rural scene but will detail a city or village nicely.





**Some Final Thoughts** 

There are many more examples for saving of and use of scrap parts for details. The rule here is to save parts, even scraps of lumber and plastic. They may become detail parts which can be used for some future but yet to be known project.









